#### Western Committee Draft 1: Recommends Disapproval 12/17/2024 Draft 1: The committee is not in support of the clarification as written. Many on the committee support a-j, but not k due to medications that are used for multiple horses (eg. Banamine). Another concern raised was about oxytocin used for breeding mares being in a medication box and not wishing to have to remove these for each show. Western Dressage Draft 1: Recommends Disapproval 12/16/2024 Draft 1: The committee is in favor on a-j, but are not supportive of k due to "herd health" medications that might not be prescribed to one horse.

## Heather Sullivan

I am not in favor of this proposed rule with regard to subsection (k) ("any prescription medication in any formulation..."). Certain prescription medications are provided on a non-horse-specific basis by veterinarians to barns to have on hand for emergency use (e.g. Banamine). It is common to travel to shows with an "emergency kit" containing these medications so that immediate care can be given while awaiting veterinarian arrival in the event of an emergency. These medications are permitted to be used with a recommended "last dose" timing prior to competition. Any prescription medication on the permitted list should be excluded from this rule.

## Susannah Lewis

As a veterinarian and USEF competitor I strongly support almost all these changes. There are two concerns I have regarding the labeling of medication. First, I would recommend including that compounded medications must have all active ingredients listed (this is already standard on FDA approved medications as well). Yes, this is a legal requirement in every state I've practiced however there are several disreputable compounding pharmacies that will label something "skin salve" or "performance vitamins" etc with absolutely no indication what is in them. I have run across this numerous times working as a horse show vet. Second, I think the requirement to have every medication labeled for the individual horse, while in some ways very appropriate and possibly even a legal requirement, is going to be very challenging or at least require a HUGE education effort to get compliance from vets and competitors. Many show barns operate on a herd basis more than an individual basis for common medications, particularly those that are USEF legal (bute, banamine, Equioxx, gastroguard), which are often brought for first aid use or by some barns given widely to many of their competing horses (never my recommendation but we all know it happens). Would gastroguard require a label (and be a violation if unlabeled) but ulcerguard not because it is over the counter, even though it is the same medication? There are a few grey areas I think it is best to consider ahead of formalizing the rule. Perhaps better wording would be that any medication requiring a medication report form if given should be required to be labeled for the individual horse? Because any medication report form should have a prescribing veterinarian listed. All the other labeling requirements seem appropriate to me.

Who is responsible for enforcing this rule? Are stewards meant to search tack trunks? Seems impossible to enforce except drug testing.

I object to item K. Every horseman I know of that shows has an emergency medicine kit. These items would include brute, banimine, preicox. All purchased from our vets to be used on the horses we haul to The show if necessary. How are you going to inforce such a rule? Search our tack rooms? You should NOT penalize all horseman for the actions of a few bad apples.

#### Amber Asbell-Jackson

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Regarding 414.8K "any prescription medication without a label identifying the horse for whom it's prescribed..." There are several prescription medications, if not all, listed under the USEF restricted medication dose and time recommendation table that are broadly dispensed under farm accounts. It would be very costly and cumbersome for trainers and owners to be required to provide each and every horse recieving these medications their own prescription.

#### **GR 414 Prohibited Practices**

[...] 6. It is a prohibited practice to administer bisphosphonates, except in horses four years of age or older and when using bisphosphonates that are FDA approved for use in horses. GR411 must be followed. 7. It is a prohibited practice to compete in Federation competitions with a tracheotomy/tracheostomy (i.e. surgical opening through the skin into the trachea).

8. It is a prohibited practice to use and/or possess any of the following substances on competition grounds:

- a. Injectable ACTH
- b. Injectable Adenosine
- c. Injectable Formaldehyde
- d. Injectable Magnesium Sulfate
- e. Injectable Melatonin
- f. Injectable Oxytocin
- g. Injectable Pentobarbital, except by a veterinarian for the purpose of euthanasia
- h. Injectable Thiamine

- i. Injectable Tryptophan
  j. Liquid Nitrogen
  k. Any injectable prescription medication in any formulation without a label identifying the horse for whom it is prescribed, the person to whom the medication was dispensed, pharmacy, prescription date, and prescribing veterinarian, unless it is in the possession of a veterinarian and not yet prescribed or otherwise prohibited under these rules.

9. It is a prohibited practice to rectally administer any substance on the grounds of a Federation competition.
